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What is VET Delivered to Secondary Students?

GOTAFE offers Vocational Education and Training (VET) Delivered to School Students (VDSS). These programs are available to Secondary School students enrolled in Government, Catholic, and Independent Schools.

We accept enrolments from students aged 15–19 who wish to undertake VET as part of their senior secondary school certificates, including the VCE Vocational Major (VM) and the Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC).

How does VDSS work?

VDSS qualifications can be completed alongside your VCE or VCE VM studies. They give you the opportunity to explore and gain new skills in the industries and career pathways that interest you.

As a VDSS student, you'll attend classes at GOTAFE one day per week at one of our campuses, or online. You'll combine VDSS study with your school classes, and your VDSS course may even contribute towards your ATAR.

Fees

When enrolling in a VDSS program at GOTAFE through your school, GOTAFE will charge your school directly for tuition and materials.

Catholic, Private and Independent schools can determine their own fee structure and we encourage you to speak with them directly about their own payment policies and expectations.

All GOTAFE material fees include learning resources and consumables (at a minimum). Additional material inclusions will be listed at program level. All fees are listed for the calendar year of enrolment only and are subject to change without notification.

Contribution to VCE, VCE Vocational Major (VM) & ATAR

VET qualifications may contribute towards your VCE, VCE Vocational Major or Victorian Pathways Certificate. To find out more information on how VET contributes to VCE, VCE Vocational Major, your ATAR and Block Credits visit the VCAA website at www.vcaa.vic.edu.au

Who can enrol?

School students

School students will attend one day a week at the relevant GOTAFE campus while continuing at school. As a school student, you stay enrolled at your school and combine your chosen VDSS training primarily with your Year 10, 11 or 12 VCE or VCE VM program.

GOTAFE students

Students enrolling in GOTAFE VCE VM can combine a VDSS course into their VCE VM program. They will attend one day a week for their VET program at the relevant campus.

Students from non-government school

Students enrolling in a non-government school can combine VDSS training for one day a week at the relevant campus with programs offered by their provider.

Home-schooled students

Please note that if you are enrolled as a home-schooled student, you are unable to apply for a VDSS program. You must be enrolled in a Secondary School program to be considered for a VDSS program.

How, where & when do I enrol?

School students

Secondary school students wishing to participate in a GOTAFE VDSS program should work with their VDSS Coordinator or Careers Advisor to submit an application to GOTAFE.

GOTAFE will then work with the school and the student to begin the process to get you enrolled into the course of your choice.

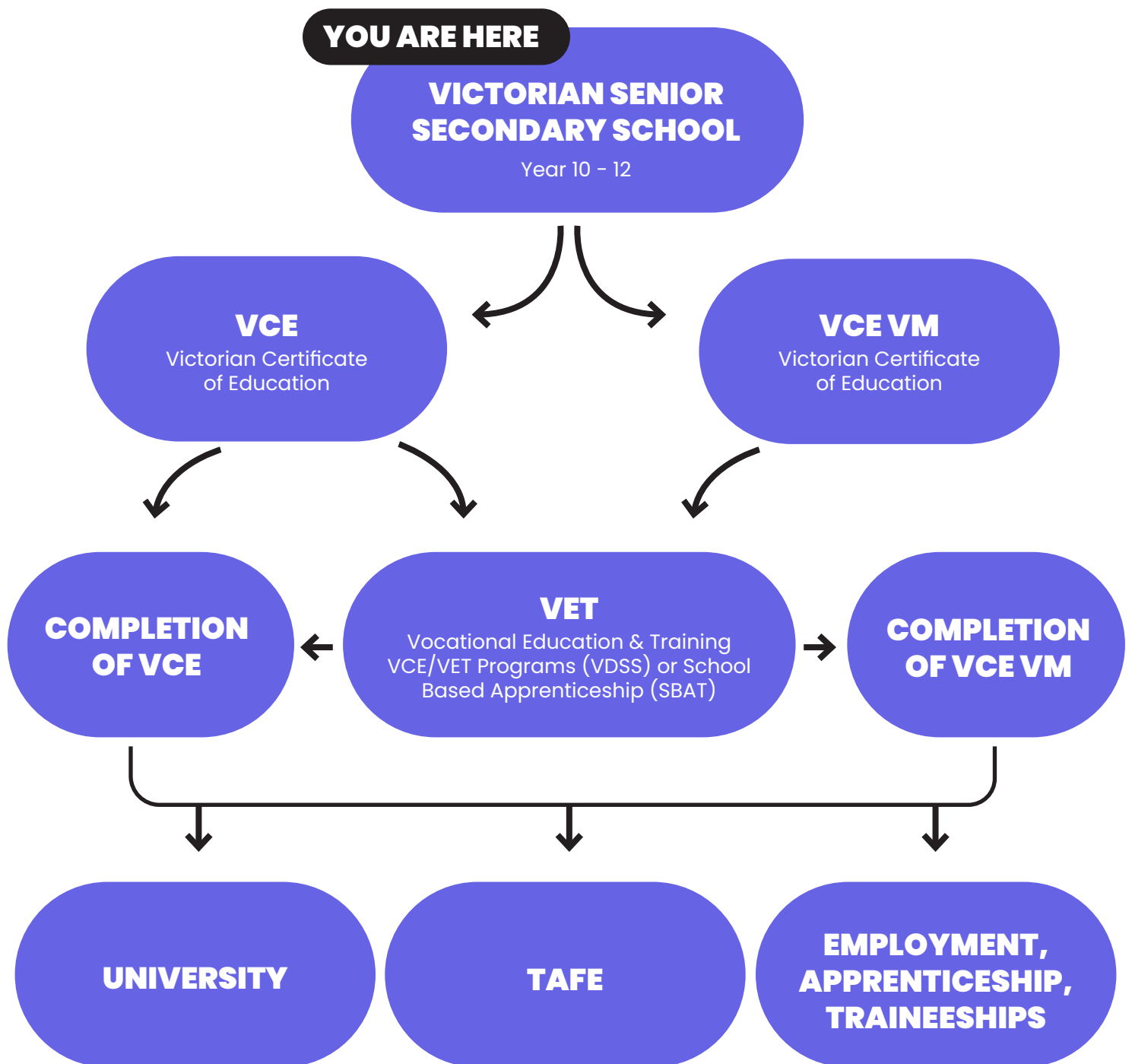
GOTAFE students

GOTAFE students wishing to undertake a VDSS program should notify their VCE VM Teacher. Upon receipt of your application from the Teacher, you will be referred to a GOTAFE VDSS staff member.

Students from non-government schools

Students undertaking their education in a non-government school should discuss their proposed program with their educational provider.

The Process

SCHOOL APPROVAL

If you know which course you're interested in, speak with your school's VET Coordinator or Careers Advisor. They can explain the VDSS application process and ensure your course selections are endorsed.

If you're unsure which course to choose, speak with your school Careers Advisor about your interests. They can connect you with a GOTAFE careers counsellor to help you explore your options.

Your course selections must be endorsed by your school before proceeding.

APPLICATION

Once your course has been chosen and approved by your school, you're ready to apply.

You can choose up to two courses – A first and second preference. Once applications open, your school will provide you with an application link.

As part of the application process, you may be required to answer course specific questions, be required to complete a pre-entry test or attend an online information session about the specific course requirements. Your school will advise you of the requirements for the courses you choose.

STUDENT SHORTLISTING PROCESS

Once your application has been received, it will be assessed that all requirements have been met. Please note that some courses have a maximum number of students per class so it is important to submit your application promptly and accurately.

If your application meets all the required criteria and is successful, you will receive an email offering you a place. To secure your place, you and your parent or guardian must accept this offer.

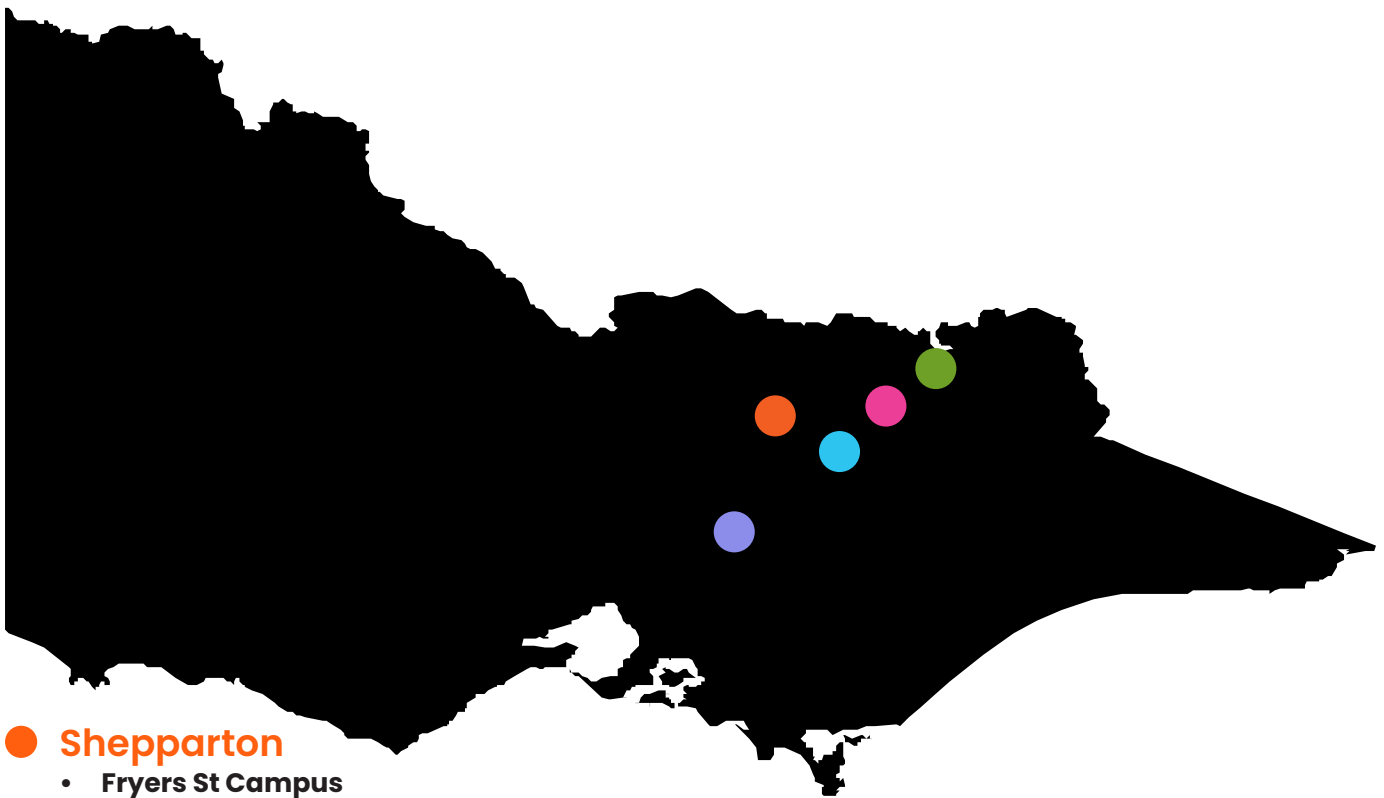

Transport

There is limited public transport to our campuses. Please ensure you discuss transport options with your schools VET Co-ordinator or Careers Advisor if required.

Things you need to know

Induction

All students must read the GOTAFE Student Handbook. The Handbook provides students with all the information and resources they need to begin their studies with GOTAFE. Induction must be completed prior to course commencement.

Program withdrawals

If you're considering withdrawing from your VDSS course, you must speak with your school first.

All withdrawals must be approved by your school, and your school is responsible for notifying GOTAFE.

Extended periods of non-attendance (e.g. three consecutive weeks without notification from a parent or school) may also lead to withdrawal from the program.

Structured Workplace Learning (SWL)

It is encouraged that students undertake work placements as part of their program during designated work placement weeks and during school holidays to extend their experience and employer networks. Work placement is mandatory in some programs but strongly encouraged in all VET programs. Contact your school for information regarding Structured Workplace Learning Recognition.

Assessment

Students will be assessed for each Unit of Competency (UoC) as being either Competent or Not Competent. The alignment will follow the principles of assessment and rules of evidence, which are the requirements of ASQA (Australian Skills Quality Authority). Assessments will be based on a demonstration of skills via completion of required tasks, written and verbal assignments, practical work, classroom participation, projects or written, verbal and/or online tests.

Pre-entry requirements

It is desirable for students to have completed work experience (in their chosen program area) through their school before joining the program. Most programs are targeted at Years 10–12, although some VET programs mandate Year 11 as a minimum entry point. As part of the application process, some courses will require you to answer course specific questions, require you to complete a pre-entry test or attend an online information session about the specific course requirements. These requirements form part of the application process and will determine your suitability, particularly for courses where there are maximum number of places available.

BYOD (Bring your own device)

All programs will require students to have their own laptop device.

GOTAFE recommends the following system requirements:

Please note: There is limited support for Chromebook and Android devices and older versions of Windows, MacOS and iOS devices.

Code of conduct

Students will be provided with the Student Code of Conduct on their first day of class during induction.

Compulsory dress requirements

Some courses have specific uniform and PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) requirements.

You'll receive full details in your course commencement information, and these will be explained during course information sessions

If you're unsure what's required, speak to your school VET coordinator.

Absences

If you are unable to attend your VDSS class, you must notify your school's VET Coordinator.

Your school is responsible for informing GOTAFE of any absences.

GOTAFE will also notify your school of any unexplained absences, late arrivals, or early departures.

Punctuality

Students are expected to arrive on time for their classes. Students who arrive late for class will be recorded as late, and their school will be notified accordingly. In some practical environments, due to OH&S regulations, students may be refused entry if they arrive late.

Communication

GOTAFE communicates directly with your school regarding your progress and any other relevant information they may request. Parents should contact their school's VET Coordinator, who will liaise with GOTAFE on your behalf.

Duration & attendance

On campus

Students must attend one day per week during the Victorian school terms for two years to complete their program.

Online & Blended Learning

Online and blended learning programs also take two years to complete. Students learn through a blend of live online webinars with industry expert teachers, tutorial support, work placements and on-campus practical workshops.

The flexibility of online programs allows students from more remote locations greater access to VDSS courses. Live online webinars are delivered on Wednesdays and attendance is compulsory. Students are also required to attend compulsory on-campus workshops as scheduled to develop and be assessed in practical skills.



Your GOTAFE commitment

By enrolling and signing the enrolment form for a chosen VDSS course you (the student):

- Agree to abide by the policies, procedures and Student Code of Conduct of GOTAFE.
- Authorise GOTAFE, or its agent, in the event of illness or accident, where next of kin/emergency contact cannot be made within reasonable time, to seek ambulance, medical or surgical treatment at your cost.

You and your parents/guardians are also made aware of the following:

- You acknowledge that non-school environments differ from school environments and direct supervision from staff will not be provided during breaks at the external provider(s).
- You are aware that no responsibility is accepted by GOTAFE for the loss, theft or damage of personal property belonging to or in the possession of students.
- GOTAFE does not provide ambulance cover.
- Next of kin will be notified as soon as practicable in the event of any illness or injury to the student.
- If GOTAFE are not able to get in touch with the parent/guardian in a timely matter, GOTAFE are authorised to administer first aid.
- Students or their parent/guardian must provide details of any known medical condition/s and any current or recent medications or treatments that may affect the student's attendance and ability to study at GOTAFE.
- Please alert GOTAFE if there are any changes to the student's details or if you become aware of any circumstances which raise concerns to the safety of the student participating in their VET course.

COURSE OVERVIEW

Are you passionate about working with animals and looking to turn that passion into a career? This course is the perfect entry point into the animal care industry, providing the foundational knowledge and hands-on skills to care for a wide range of companion animals.

You'll learn how to:

- Work safely and responsibly in the companion animal industry
- Provide daily care for a variety of animals, including feeding, grooming, and enrichment
- Support animal health and welfare through basic hygiene, handling, and observation techniques
- Communicate effectively with clients and colleagues in a professional setting
- Apply workplace health and safety practices in animal care environments

This course is delivered through blended learning, with weekly online webinars (Wednesdays) during school terms and compulsory practical skills workshops at the Wangaratta Tone Rd campus. Students must have access to a laptop and reliable internet.

MANDATORY PLACEMENT

To successfully complete the course, students must also undertake a minimum of 40 hours of Structured Workplace Learning (SWL) in a companion animal business across the two years.

COMPULSORY PRACTICAL SKILLS WORKSHOPS

Students must attend two practical skills workshops during each year of the program. In addition, all first year students are required to attend a face-to-face induction day at the beginning of Term 1. The purpose of the workshops are to:

- Provide students with strategies for working safely with animals
- Expose students to a variety of animals found in the industry
- Prepare for structured workplace learning
- Meet staff and fellow students
- Complete practical assessment tasks
- Develop skills and knowledge in various other areas relevant to working in the animal care industry.

Workshops are only delivered at Wangaratta Regional Study Centre Tone Rd, Wangaratta.

PERSONAL REQUIREMENTS

Students who are well-suited to the animal care industries typically demonstrate a strong sense of compassion and empathy toward animals, alongside a genuine interest in their welfare. They are patient, observant, and responsible, understanding that animal care often requires dedication, routine, and the ability to respond calmly in unpredictable situations.

A good candidate is physically active and not deterred by hands-on tasks, such as cleaning, feeding, and handling animals in varied environments. They should also possess good communication skills to interact effectively with pet owners, team members, and professionals, as well as a willingness to learn about animal health, behavior, and safety practices.

CAREER PATHWAYS

Entry level positions in various animal care settings, including animal shelters, veterinary clinics, pet grooming services, and wildlife care facilities.

COURSE OVERVIEW

Are you passionate about horses and considering a future in the equine industry? This course is designed to give you the practical skills and scientific knowledge needed to care for, handle, and manage horses in a variety of settings.

You'll learn how to:

- Handle horses safely in stables, paddocks, and at trackwork
- Follow safe work practices in equine environments
- Understand horse anatomy and physiology, and relate form to function
- Prepare feeding programs and monitor equine health and welfare
- Identify and describe equine breeding practices, including the care of pregnant mares, foals, and young horses
- Work effectively in equine organisations and apply workplace communication and teamwork skills
- Support veterinary and breeding procedures through knowledge of horse biology and healthcare

This qualification provides a pathway to further training or employment in areas such as racing, breeding, equine veterinary services, riding instruction, or equestrian facility management.

The course is delivered through blended learning, combining weekly online live webinars (Wednesdays) with compulsory in-person practical workshops held at the Wangaratta Tone Rd campus. Students must have access to a computer and reliable internet.

RECOMMENDED PLACEMENT

To successfully complete the course, students are encouraged to undertake 80 hours of Structured Workplace Learning (SWL) in an approved equine facility across the two years.

COMPULSORY PRACTICAL SKILLS WORKSHOPS

Students must attend two practical skills workshops during each year of the program. In addition, all first year students are required to attend a face-to-face induction day at the beginning of Term 1. The purpose of the workshops are to:

- Provide students with strategies for working safely around horses
- Complete practical assessment tasks
- Demonstrate practical skills working with horses, including equine health and first aid techniques
- Meet staff and fellow students
- Complete practical assessment tasks
- Prepare for the VCE exam if undertaking Scored assessment

In addition to workshops, opportunities to attend extra curriculum activities to further knowledge across all aspects of Equine industry through Seminars and excursions are available to students in the school holidays.

Workshops are only delivered at Wangaratta Regional Study Centre Tone Rd, Wangaratta.

PERSONAL REQUIREMENTS

This course is suited to students who:

- Have a genuine love of horses and a desire to work with them regularly
- Are confident and responsible around large animals
- Can remain calm, observant, and focused in dynamic or potentially hazardous environments

Interested in a career in agriculture, farming, or rural industries? This hands-on program gives students the opportunity to learn and work in a real farm environment while developing practical, job-ready skills.

Delivered at the William Orr Farm campus, students gain experience with livestock, farm machinery, fencing, land management, and modern agricultural practices.

You'll learn how to:

- Assist with animal care, feeding, handling, and welfare practices
- Operate basic farm machinery and equipment safely, including tractors and side-by-side vehicles
- Carry out fencing, irrigation, and general farm maintenance tasks
- Work with livestock such as sheep and cattle in a working farm environment
- Identify weeds and understand basic soil and pasture management practices
- Follow workplace health and safety procedures and farm biosecurity requirements
- Understand sustainable farming practices and responsible land management
- Work effectively as part of a team and adapt to changing farm conditions

Students develop practical skills using industry-standard equipment, including livestock handling facilities, tractors, agricultural tools, and tractor simulators, while gaining an understanding of modern farming operations.

This qualification provides pathways into a range of agricultural industries, including livestock production, cropping, farm operations, rural services, and further study in agriculture and related fields.
